Lesson:



INTRODUCE JAM STRAGETIES:

Preselect activities from your JAM lesson to model/practice. Introduce JAM to the students. Model and practice your selected strategies with the children. <u>JAM Strategies</u>.

INTRODUCE CLASS CHARTER:

Brainstorm the reason rules are important with the children. Have them imagine a class or home without rules. Have a student-led brainstorming session to create a class charter (if you don't have one already). Capture your brainstorming session with their ideas. These rules will be followed and referenced all year. This is a positive reinforcement for your expectations. The sign can be in pictures or words. It is important that they know what they are signing. Have all the children sign. This document is valuable in centering individuals and the group on the agreed shared values. Be Sure to use your Charter to joyfully remind your class of agreed rules and routines as you play.



Leave 5-10 minutes at the end for your Community Circle to review your lesson and wrap up any pressing questions. This is a gathering of the group to debrief on the learning and share lows, highs and Shout Outs. Community Circles are great tools for rebuilding community and strengthening bonds of trust.
