# Lesson:



- This lesson introduces the students to Anansi the spider, West Africa's original Griot (storyteller). This trickster has many tales to tell and this one tells how wisdom came into the world.
- Review your Charter, JAM strategies and last lesson's Community Circle.
- Play the video. The Magic of Anansi Animation and Cartoon Videos Ask questions to help guide your discussion.
  - Why did Anasi feel like the animals did not respect him?
  - How do you show respect?
- Play the video Fun Facts About Africa. <u>Learn About West African Culture</u> | <u>African Dance and Music Field Trip</u>. This is a virtual field trip to West Africa. There is a craft activity to do at the end. This activity is similar to one in the video. You are always free to dance along.
- Enjoy creating your headband with the class. The students create their own headband or pom-pom belt (See JAM)



Create Your Own African Headband (10-15 minutes)

Pass out headdress materials to students. Have students decorate their own headband. Ensure that students are thoughtful and prepare to share their work with the group.

**Closing Community Circle (5-10 minutes)** 

In the final minutes allow participants to share their thoughts on today's lesson.
